

Fire and Police Open House

Saturday, October 15 @ 10:00 AM – 2:00 PM

To conclude Fire Prevention Week, the Winnetka Fire and Police Departments will host an open house on Saturday, October 15. All area residents are invited to visit the Public Safety Building (428 Green Bay Road) from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. This much-anticipated annual event is an excellent way for residents to tour both departments and connect with their Public Safety Team.

Attendees will have a chance to watch members of the Fire Department demonstrate a vehicle extrication. Other activities include operating a fire hose, a fire extinguisher simulator, and tours of the police station. Members of the Fire and Police Departments will be on hand to show residents the various apparatus and answer any questions. Food and refreshments will be provided for those attending.

Curbside Leaf Collection Begins October 17

Winnetka's annual curbside leaf collection program will run from Monday, October 17 until Monday, November 28. Under this program, residents may rake their leaves to the parkway just inside the edge of the curb for collection by the Village.

Please do not rake leaves into the streets. This creates a hazard, as leaves are slippery when wet; and also can clog storm sewers, leading to flooded streets and yards.

Collection crews will begin in the northwest corner of town along Scott Avenue, and work their way south, west of Green Bay Road. When the west side of town is completed, collection will commence in the southeast portion of town and work north, east of Green Bay Road. When one such round is complete, crews begin again and continue in a like manner. The time needed to complete a round varies; however, the Village aims to complete 6 to 8 rounds during the length of the program.

Leaves must be placed on the parkway no later than 7:00 AM daily and by the last day of collection. Leaves placed out after the program ends must be placed in Winnetka yard waste bags or in plain paper yard waste bags with a Village yard waste sticker affixed. These bags should weigh no more than 70 pounds when filled and will be collected as part of the regular curbside yard waste program. Bags and stickers are available for \$2.00 each at the Grand Food Center or Lakeside Foods.

National Fire Prevention Week

Each year the Winnetka Fire Department promotes fire prevention education during Fire Prevention Week. This tradition was established in October of every year to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire that occurred on October 8th 1871. Fire prevention activities are held in communities throughout the nation. Winnetka participates each year in hopes of keeping the public informed about the importance of fire prevention. School presentations will take place Monday through Friday with various fire safety topics covered.


This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Don't Wait – Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years," represents the final year of our three-year effort to educate the public about basic but essential elements of smoke alarm safety.

Why focus on smoke alarms three years in a row? Because NFPA's survey data shows that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms, which may put them at increased risk in the event of a home fire. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are, or how often they need to be replaced.

As a result of those and related findings, we're addressing smoke alarm replacement this year with a focus on these key messages:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

A Message from E. Gene Greable, the Village President



Across the nation, the public focus is on the upcoming Presidential Election; here in Winnetka, we are preoccupied with stormwater management. Following the devastating storm and flooding of July 23, the Village Council took immediate action: we reinstated funding for the Backflow Prevention Program, which was defunded in 2013 by a previous Council; we adopted a Resolution waiving building permit fees for flood restoration work; and released an online survey to collect valuable flood information from residents. The Council's October Study Session will be devoted to a discussion with Strand Associates about possible immediate steps to provide short-term flood relief, until cooperation from the Cook County Forest Preserve District and other land owners in Winnetka is secured for the larger objective of providing comprehensive flood risk reduction. More about stormwater can be found on page 5.

Another topic of great interest in the Village is the One Winnetka preliminary planned development application, which will be discussed by the Council at the September 20 Regular Meeting. At a well-attended special Council Meeting on July 27, the developer presented a revised proposal, followed by extensive public comment. The Council had some final requests for the developer, and expects that after a final discussion and remaining public comment, a vote will be taken on whether to grant preliminary approval for the project.

After nearly a year of work, Winnetka's Downtown Master Plan is complete! On August 29, the public was able to view the draft plan at a launch party prior to the final Steering Committee meeting. The Council will review and discuss the draft plan at its September Study Session. For more on the Downtown Master Plan, turn to page 7.

The Village launched several technological upgrades over the summer; notably the release of a new mobile-friendly website; and a long-awaited program that allows the use of credit cards for utility payments. Read more about these developments on page 5.

Winnetka played host to some outstanding community events over the summer, including the North Shore Art League's Art in the Village art fair, Independence Day festivities celebrating our nation's birthday; the Sidewalk Sale/Let Loose on Lincoln; and a Wednesday night concert series in Hubbard Woods Park.

Village staff is currently assembling their recommended departmental budgets for the 2017 fiscal year, which begins on January 1, 2017. The Village Council will meet in October and November to review these recommendations. The Budget meetings are open to the public, and I encourage you to engage and offer your input on the development of our 2017 Budget. As always, we remain committed to providing the high quality services residents and business owners expect. After the Budget discussions are concluded, a Public Hearing will be scheduled before final action is taken in mid-November. 2016 Fall Tree Planting

Curbside Leaf Collection Begins October 17

Please follow these guidelines to ensure safe and efficient service:

Rake leaves into a pile(s) on the parkway parallel to the curb but not in the street to reduce hazards and enable crews to move quickly and efficiently.

- Remove stones, litter, branches or other landscape debris. Piles containing these items cannot be collected, as they can damage equipment and injure workers.
- Avoid placing leaves in front of storm drains or utility covers.
- Avoid piling leaves around cars, boulders, fire hydrants, trees or posts.
- Avoid parking on top or adjacent to the leaf piles.
- Do not rake to alleys or service roads.

Leaf piles that are mixed with grass trimmings, branches, brush or other yard waste will not be collected. They must be bagged for collection as part of the regular curbside yard waste program. For more information, call the Public Works Department at 847-716-3568.

Urban Forest Under Attack



Water your trees to help keep them resistant to pests

The urban forest in 2016 has seen an increase of insect and disease problems. Many of these problems are associated with changing weather patterns, especially since the severe drought of 2012. Stressed trees are more susceptible to insect and disease problems.

Oak trees are one of many tree species suffering increasing losses due to weather, insects and diseases. Oaks and other trees suffered root loss due to alternating drought and periodic severe flooding over the past few years. Root loss stresses trees and leaves them vulnerable

to boring insects like the Two-lined Chestnut Borer. This insect lays eggs in stressed oak trees. Young larvae feed under the bark and cause girdling of the tree's water and food conducting vascular system. The girdling causes many oak trees to die from the top down and can lead to eventual total tree mortality in just a few years.

Bur Oaks are susceptible to a new disease in Illinois, Bur Oak Blight, a fungus that enters on leaves. Cool, wet rainy spring weather conditions as the Village has been having the last few years helps promote ideal fungus-growing conditions. As summer progresses, leaves will discolor, distort and drop prematurely, starting in the bottom branches of the tree. Over a few years, affected trees will have branch dieback and can eventually die from the fungus invasion.

The best prevention against insects and disease is proper tree care. Water when dry conditions prevail – which would be when no rain falls for two or more weeks in the growing seasons. Some insecticide treatments to control borers can be applied as a preventative by certified arborists. Some fertilizers and growth regulators help improve tree root growth.



Council Action Summary

2016/17 Winnetka Village Council

June 7, 2016: Strand Associates presented the Final Concept Report of the Stormwater Alternatives Study for Western and Southwestern Winnetka. Strand was hired by the Village to evaluate Winnetka's western watershed for stormwater management and flood control opportunities. Project Manager Mike Waldron reviewed watershed boundaries and topographical information, and confirmed modeling demonstrating the depth of floods in 2011. Strand recommends a four-phase Concept Vision costing an estimated \$57.7 million. After hearing extensive public questions and comments, the Council adjourned the meeting, and the discussion was continued until the June 14 Study Session.

June 14, 2016: The Council again discussed Strand Associates' Final Concept Report. The Trustees agreed that the recommendations are on the right track and technically solid. After another round of public comment, the Council directed Strand to develop phasing for several fast-track projects and to submit a proposal to identify flood reduction opportunities for those homes not included in the Concept Vision.

June 21, 2016.: The Winnetka Park District presented its Winnetka Waterfront 2030 Lakefront Master Plan. The plan has been two years in the making, and was partially funded by a grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources.

July 12, 2016: The Council heard a refuse and recycling analysis from the Environmental & Forestry Commission. It was noted that the property tax levy has not fully covered the cost of refuse collection since 1996, and overages for the program are taken from the General Fund. The Council discussed opportunities to encourage the public to reduce what it puts into the waste stream, requested more cost information, and approved researching a possible joint refuse program with Glencoe.


Council Offers Assistance to Homeowners Affected by July Flooding

At the August 2 Regular Council Meeting, Public Works Director/Village Engineer Steve Saunders reviewed events from the severe storms of July 23 that caused serious flooding in Winnetka after producing nearly five inches of rain over a six-hour period.

Mr. Saunders reported that a few properties were still subject to overland flooding in areas that were helped by recent stormwater improvements in northeastern Winnetka. The Village is working to understand the factors which contributed to lingering flooding in these areas.

Despite sanitary sewer repairs that were completed in eight sewer basins since 2011 there were still a number of backups reported after the July storm. It is unclear whether Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) sewer intercepts in Winnetka are surcharging and contributing to basement backups. A regional inflow/infiltration study by the MWRD is anticipated to be released this fall, and is expected to provide information to guide the Village's efforts in remediating basement backups.

Mr. Saunders reported that the Strand Associates Final Concept Report for Winnetka's western drainage basins relies heavily on cooperation with the Cook County Forest Preserve District. Since this process will necessarily take significant time, Strand is currently working to identify portions of improvements contained its Final Report that could be swiftly designed and implemented in an



effort to bring faster relief to portions of the project area. Their report is expected to be considered this fall, in time to consider funding any such projects for implementation in 2017.

Finally, the Village Council approved a measure reinstating funding for the Village's Backflow Prevention Program, and passed a Resolution eliminating building permit fees for storm-related repair work and backflow prevention systems.

At the August 16 Regular Council Meeting, Mr. Saunders reported that his office has received approximately 40 inquiries about the Backflow Prevention Program. He recommended adding more funds for the program to ensure the interested homeowners can benefit from the program. The Council unanimously approved the recommendation, and added \$50,000 to fully fund the program through the end of 2016.

The Council also approved extending the Backflow Prevention Program's benefits retroactively to qualified homeowners who installed systems during the three years the program was defunded. Those who had applications pending at the time the program was defunded will be reimbursed first, and staff was directed to bring back information on how many other people would qualify for retroactive cost-sharing, based on a search of building permit applications.

Follow Pool Drainage Rules to Protect Groundwater



Chlorinated Water is Toxic to Plant and Wildlife

Residents draining their pools are required to remove chlorine prior to emptying the water. Chlorinated water discharged directly to surface waters, roadways or storm sewers has an adverse impact on local water quality, since concentrations of chlorine are toxic to wildlife and fish.

further addition of chlorine or bromine. It is recommended that the chlorine level be tested to ensure safe levels (below 0.1 mg/l).

1. De-chlorinate the water in the pool through mechanical or chemical means – products are readily available at local stores. Allow pool water to sit at least 2 days in the sun, and without
2. Drain the pool over a period of several days – pool discharge should be directed across your lawn, not down your driveway or into nearby storm sewer inlets. Winnetka's storm sewer system leads directly to wetlands, streams, lakes or rivers.

These recommendations are based on guidance from the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency. Visit epa.state.il.us/water for additional information. You may also contact the Village of Winnetka Public Works Department at 847-716-3568. Please do your part to help promote cleaner wetlands, streams, lakes and rivers.

Flood Risk Reduction Remains a Top Priority

Last fall, the Village engaged Strand Associates to re-evaluate the Village's western drainage basins for creative, cost-effective stormwater improvements for the 100-year event. Last June, the Village Council discussed Strand's final report, which identified potential stormwater management and flood control opportunities. This proposed four-phase Vision consists of 15 discrete stormwater storage and conveyance projects, water quality improvement projects, and distributed green infrastructure improvements. If fully implemented, the projects in this Vision would significantly reduce the number of homes in the watershed that are at risk of flooding during the design event.

The Village Council identified two follow-up actions for Strand and Village staff. First, a key project in the proposed Vision is a restoration and improvement of land west of Hibbard Road and north of Winnetka Avenue for use as storage for a significant amount of stormwater. This property is owned by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, and there are still a number of details that need to be addressed before the concept could be presented to the Forest Preserve District Board of Commissioners for approval. The Council directed Strand and Village staff to work with the Forest Preserve to identify and resolve key issues, so the Village can focus on implementation and funding plans for the remaining portions of the Vision with confidence in its ultimate effectiveness. During several meetings with Forest Preserve staff, issues related to water storage, water quality, long-term maintenance, and Forest Preserve improvements have been discussed, and details are being developed.

Second, recognizing that full implementation of the Vision is a long-term effort, the Council directed Strand Associates to re-evaluate the project phasing to determine if portions of the Vision could be implemented relatively quickly. This could provide some level of early relief to areas affected by flooding. Strand will present its evaluation of early implementation alternatives to the Village Council in October.

The Village is conducting an online survey aimed at gathering accurate information about basement flooding during the July 23 storm; of particular interest are incidents of sanitary sewer backups. It is hoped that this community-wide survey will provide information to help with the Village's evaluation of its sanitary sewer system, with an eye towards planning for possible future improvements.

Village of Winnetka Accepts Online Credit Card Payments for Utility Bills

The Winnetka Finance Department went live with an online credit card utility bill payment system on Monday, June 18. Most customers will be able to access a secure online utility account portal where they can not only make payments, but also download copies of bills and review usage data.

Customers simply need their utility account number and last name (as it appears on their bill) to login. The online payment system accepts American Express, Discover,

Mastercard, and VISA credit cards. For security purposes, credit card information is not stored by the Village and customer payment information is SSL encrypted by our merchant services provider.

Note: There are no fees associated with paying your utility bill online. However, certain wholesale or high-volume customers will be unable to use this service. If you require assistance accessing your online utility account, please contact Utility Billing at 847-446-9550.

July 27, 2016: This meeting was devoted to a discussion of the One Winnetka Planned Development Preliminary Application. The developer presented a revised plan, and the Village's financial consultants from CBRE confirmed that the proposal in its revised form will provide substantial benefits to Winnetka. The amended proposal also eliminates a request for public funding. After exhaustive public questions and comments were heard, the Council continued the matter to its September 20 Regular Meeting.

August 2, 2016: Public Works Director Steve Saunders presented the facts surrounding the July 23 storm and subsequent flooding, describing the Village's response. There was an extensive public comment period, and then the Council unanimously supported reinstating funding for the Backflow Prevention Program. The Council also voted to waive building permit fees for storm repairs.

August 16, 2016: The Council approved a request for extra funding for the Backflow Prevention Program, due to the amount of community interest in this cost-sharing program. The Village's auditor, Ron Amen, of Lauterbach & Amen, presented the 2015 audit. Mr. Amen noted that the Village is once again in a strong financial position, and retains its Aaa bond rating.

September 6, 2016: Most of Winnetka's water distribution system was installed in the early 1900's. Last December, the Council engaged Burns & McDonnell to develop a prioritization plan for replacement of aging water infrastructure, and also to perform a rate study to identify payment options. The Council heard the preliminary report on the water main replacement plan and rate study, and concluded that more comparable data and financial information is needed before any further steps can be taken.

A Message from the Police Chief



Don't Invite Danger - Lock It or Lose It!

Six Winnetka automobiles have been stolen this summer. All of the vehicles were left unlocked with the keys and/or key fobs left inside. Numerous other unlocked vehicles have been burglarized.

These crimes are part of a pattern committed by dangerous criminals linked to Chicago street gangs. Criminals have found "easy pickings" in Winnetka and other suburbs, regularly locating unlocked vehicles with keys inside. Valuables are often taken from unlocked vehicles even if keys are not found. In some cases, garage door openers were used to enter and burglarize homes. Force is rarely used to enter a locked vehicle.

These criminals are frequently armed, flee from police when confronted and often crash vehicles, resulting in injury. Stolen vehicles are frequently used in the commission of violent crimes such as armed robberies, car-jackings and shootings.

One car recently stolen in Winnetka was recovered with extensive damage, including multiple bullet holes. We are asking all citizens to recognize the dangers associated with leaving vehicles unlocked or keys and fobs left inside.

Winnetka Police are collaborating with other law enforcement agencies and have increased patrols in order to address this threat. However, arrests alone will not solve this problem. The prevention of these crimes requires your help and a change in some bad habits.

Village Proudly Announces Arrival of Downtown Master Plan

Just under a year in the making, Winnetka's first Downtown Master Plan (DMP) — focusing on Elm Street, Hubbard Woods, and Indian Hill business districts — has arrived. On August 29, 2016, Teska Associates and the DMP Steering Committee hosted a Preview Party to showcase the draft plan document to the community and celebrate all of the contributions that make such a plan possible. Following the Preview Party, the Steering Committee conducted its final review and voted to advance the DMP to the Village Council for consideration.

The DMP was guided by an eleven-member Steering Committee, which was also supported by over 70 participating Working Group members. In addition, the community participated throughout the process — attending workshops and discussion and sharing their visions for the future through polls, chalkboards, and online forums. Without these critical contributions, this project would not have been possible.

In the Steering Committee's August 2016 letter to the Village Council they appropriately noted, "This is not the end of the process. While our work is done, yours is just beginning. These recommendations covered a lot of ground — literally and

figuratively. Our hope is that this Plan gives the seven of you, future council members, staff, developers and others the tools to guide, build and invigorate our downtowns for years to come."

Meg Benson, the Steering Committee Chair, and Michael Blue of Teska Associates presented the Plan to the Village Council on September 13, 2016. They provided an overview of the process, highlighting the public outreach, tools, and events; the individual district Vision Statements; lessons learned; key recommendations from each Plan chapter; and the DMP Action Plan.

The Village Council expressed thanks to the Steering Committee, Working Groups, Teska Associates and most importantly, the community's contributions. They concurred with the conceptual findings of the Plan and anticipated working together to identify action items for implementation in 2017. It is anticipated the Council will formally adopt the DMP at its October 18 Regular Meeting. In addition, a discussion of the action items will take place in October during the Fiscal Year 2017 Budget process, so that funding can be secured.

2017 Budget Planning is Underway

Village staff has begun preparing the 2017 Annual Budget, which establishes the spending plan for achieving strategic goals established by the Village Council. Departmental budgets are prepared using a "zero-based budgeting method" in which all expenses, even recurring expenses, must be justified anew each year. This ensures the efficient allocation of resources, since it is based on needs and benefits rather than history. There are a number of key issues affecting the 2017 budget, including:

- Stormwater Management / Flood Reduction Initiatives
- Intergovernmental Cooperation to Control Costs
- Aging Infrastructure
- Increased Pension Funding Requirements
- Downtown Redevelopment
- Threatened Revenues Due to the State of Illinois Budget Impasse

This year, the Finance Department will prepare the final budget document in accordance with standards presented by the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA). In a bid to win the GFOA distinguished budget award, the Village will satisfy nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation, including a more detailed Capital Improvement Plan, comprehensive information on Village fund balances and fund

balance targets, historical property tax information, more graphics, and an easy-to-navigate online document.

The Village is committed to proposing a budget that continues Winnetka's long-standing practice of controlling operating costs while investing in capital improvements and infrastructure repairs. The 2017 budget will be balanced – routine annual operating expenses will be fully funded by routine annual operating revenues, and will not rely on debt service or any one-time revenue sources.

The Village Council will review the proposed Annual Budget at public meetings on October 20, 25, 27, and, if necessary, on November 1. The public is encouraged to attend the Budget meetings as well as the final public hearing on the budget, which scheduled for November 15.
