Council Action Summary

December 17, 2024: Discussion of a zoning exception at 270 Birch Street was continued to the January 7 meeting to allow the applicant to revise their proposed plans. A zoning variation to allow for the construction of a detached garage at 630 Walden Road was discussed and approved. An ordinance granting zoning variations and a certificate of appropriateness for construction of a new commercial building at 933 Green Bay Road was discussed and approved. An ordinance opting out of the Cook County Paid Leave Ordinance to reduce administrative burdens for New Trier High School, Winnetka School District 36 and the Winnetka Park District was discussed and approved.

January 7, 2025: A grant agreement between the Village and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity for costs associated with infrastructure improvements, including the Village's stormwater project, was discussed and approved. A closed session was held for the purpose of discussing pending litigation, probable or imminent litigation, and the purchase or lease of real property pursuant to Sections 2(c)(11) and 2(c)(5) of the Open Meetings Act.

January 14, 2025: A study session was held to discuss the Village's east side stormwater project. Strand Associates, the Village's contractor, provided Council an update regarding existing flooding conditions and possible remedies (including conveyance, piping, underground storage, infrastructure improvements, and other stormwater reduction opportunities). Future milestones were discussed, including the timing of the finalization of Strand Associates' study, public open houses, and presentations to the public.

January 21, 2025: A public hearing was held to discuss the final approval of the planned development known as "One Winnetka." An ordinance granting the final approval, zoning exceptions, a special use for ground floor parking, and special uses for medical and financial services was discussed and adopted for 511 – 515 Lincoln Avenue and 714 – 740 Elm Street. A final plat of subdivision was also approved for this property.

February 4, 2025: An amendment to an existing parking agreement between the Village and New Trier School District 203 was discussed and approved to modify the number of available parking spaces and the terms of the financial agreement. A closed session was held for the purpose of discussing specific personnel pursuant to 2(c)(1) of the Open Meetings Act.

February 11, 2025: A study session was held to discuss the contract renewal with the Illinois Municipal Electric Agency (IMEA). Representatives from IMEA presented to Council and members of the public regarding the agency's partnership with Winnetka and other members, its mission to deliver reliable power at lower costs, its commitment to net-zero energy by 2050, and investments in wind, solar, and battery storage to diversify power supply. The need for contract renewal was discussed: in order to make long-term investments in future energy resources and fulfill its commitment to net-zero energy, IMEA is asking its member communities to renew this year, though the existing contract expires in 2035. Public comment was heard on this issue. Council discussed Winnetka's energy needs, the power systems utilized by various other communities that are not part of IMEA, anticipated debt related to the transition to carbon-neutral, utilization of alternate power agencies other than IMEA, the benefits of resource ownership through IMEA, and resource replacement/increases and anticipated cost additions if a transition to a different agency took place. Discussion of this matter was continued to a future meeting.

February 18, 2025: A non-exclusive license agreement for use of Village property to allow event promoter Valslist, LLC to present the Winnetka Music Festival was discussed and approved. A temporary occupancy agreement for retail pop-up store North Shore Boards at 754 Elm Street was discussed and approved. A closed session was held for the purpose of discussing collective bargaining, security procedures, and municipal utility contracts pursuant to 2(c)(2), 2(c)(8), and 2(c)(23) of the Open Meetings Act.

February 27, 2025: A special meeting was held for the purpose of discussing specific personnel pursuant to 2(c)(1) of the Open Meetings Act.

March 4, 2025: A contract with Honeywell International for advanced utility metering infrastructure was discussed and approved, along with a contract with Power System Engineering for implementation of the advanced utility metering infrastructure. An agreement with Stanley Consultants was discussed and approved for a generation replacement study regarding the steam turbines at the Electric Plant.

Village Contracting with P4 Security for Enhanced Community Monitoring Beginning April 1



In recent years, law enforcement agencies across the country have been facing significant hiring challenges. To continue to effectively address criminal activity in the area at a time when the Winnetka Police Department is understaffed, the Village will temporarily contract with P4 Security Solutions to provide enhanced community monitoring beginning on April 1, 2025.

It's important to note that P4 Security Solutions will not assume the duties of Winnetka Police Officers. If there is an emergency or police assistance is needed, please call 911 for a police officer response.

P4 Security Solutions' main function in Winnetka will be to observe, detect, and report suspicious activity to Winnetka Police Officers, while acting as a visible deterrent. P4 Security Solutions will provide extra sets of experienced eyes and an enhanced security presence in our community. Their vehicles are clearly marked so community members can easily differentiate them from Winnetka Police squad cars (see right). P4 Security Solutions' staff consists of off-duty law enforcement officers who possess the knowledge, training, and experience to provide timely and effective support to Winnetka Police Officers. The staff provided by P4 Security Solutions will be a consistent roster of individuals familiar with the area.

The contract with P4 Security Solutions will allow the Winnetka Police Department to continue to provide exceptional service to our community while prioritizing the recruitment of new police officers. The hiring of qualified officers is a lengthy process which can take 10 months to one year. This temporary solution will help reduce the existing strain on our talented and dedicated police officers, who make personal sacrifices to maintain a consistent presence in our community despite the challenges of an understaffed department.

One Winnetka – Elm Street & Lincoln Avenue

This spring, the Murphy Development Group plans to begin construction on the proposed One Winnetka project on the southeast corner of Lincoln Avenue and Elm Street. Demolition of the existing buildings is currently scheduled to begin in April, and construction of the new building is currently expected to be substantially complete in the fall of 2026. The development includes a four-story mixed-use building consisting of:

- 59 residential rental units with 1, 2 and 3-bedroom units
- Approximately 20,000 square feet of street-level commercial space, which the development team has announced that Ballyhoo Hospitality, the owners of the Pomeroy restaurant, will open a restaurant in a portion of that space
- Ground level parking spaces for the commercial uses and lower-level parking for the residential uses

Economic Development Update

The Elm Street train station has new businesses: **Hofherr Meat Depot** replaced Café Fleurette and will offer grab-and-go sandwiches and meals to order. **North Shore Boards** opened a pop-up in the train station selling skateboards, paddle boards, and surfboards now through May 15. Antique and home goods store **Redefined Decor** relocated from the West Loop to 994 Green Bay Road in Hubbard Woods. **Munder Skiles** furniture expanded into the storefront next door to their existing retail shop at 913 Green Bay Road. Bespoke men's tailor shop **ESQ** opened in Hubbard Woods at 1085 Gage Street.

Annual Street Rehabilitation Program

The Village will continue infrastructure maintenance on various streets this spring and summer, including asphalt and concrete patching in multiple locations. The Village has awarded this year's street rehabilitation program to A Lamp Concrete Contractors, Inc. after a competitive bidding process. The roads listed below will be under construction:

STREET	LIMITS	SCOPE OF WORK
Foxdale Avenue	Tower Road to Humboldt Avenue	Water Main/Street Rehabilitation
Cherry Street	Glendale Avenue to Locust Street	Water Main/Street Rehabilitation
Burr Avenue	Westmoor Road to Chatfield Road	Road Resurface
Laurel Avenue	Westmoor Road to Chatfield Road	Road Resurface
Chestnut Street	Willow Road to Hill Road	Road Resurface

The work will consist of milling the existing road surface, repairing curbs as necessary, replacement of damaged public sidewalk, minor storm/sanitary sewer structure repair, replacement of water mains and related water services, and resurfacing. Residents affected by construction will be notified via mail, and those affected by the installation of new water mains and water services will be notified prior to work taking place and a minimum of 48 hours before any water service interruptions.

Construction is scheduled to begin in April.



Sidewalk Replacement Program

Each year, the Village of Winnetka performs sidewalk and curb maintenance. These repairs ensure safety and reduce liability for property owners and the Village. Construction is scheduled to begin in June and be complete by the end of August. Residents in areas where work will be performed will be notified before work begins.

Upcoming IDOT Construction on Green Bay Road

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has informed the Village of their intent to conduct a roadway rehabilitation project on Green Bay Road in 2025. This project will include milling and resurfacing of Green Bay Road from the southern municipal boundaries of Glencoe through Winnetka, and into Kenilworth. Additionally, IDOT is proposing improvements to various sections of sidewalk along this corridor to achieve ADA compliance, and improvement of pedestrian traffic signals. All work activities will occur within the Green Bay Road right-of-way. Once IDOT has selected a contractor, and a pre-construction meeting is held with the IDOT team, the Village expects more detailed information to become available, including the project commencement and completion dates.

Unlike the recent Streetscape improvement projects in the Village, this project will be managed by IDOT. The Village will work closely with IDOT through this project, if you have questions about this work, please call the Engineering Department at **847-716-3568**.





Message from the Fire Chief

This spring, the Winnetka Fire Department wishes to remind you to include carbon monoxide (CO) prevention in your spring cleaning plans. Often called an “invisible killer,” CO is a colorless, odorless gas that can cause flu-like symptoms and cause disorientation. Each year, Winnetka firefighters respond to over 50 non-fire CO-related calls.

Some CO prevention tips for your spring-cleaning checklist should include:

- Clean your fireplace, wood/fuel burning stoves, and other chimneys annually to ensure debris and nesting animals have not blocked their air flow.
- Use portable generators outdoors, at least 20 feet away from your home and downwind from any open vents or doors.
- Gas and charcoal grills should only be operated outdoors at least 10 feet away from structures: never indoors or within a garage.
- Inspect and clean all outdoor vents, including the dryer vent.
- Ensure your furnace and heating equipment are inspected annually by a licensed professional (or according to the manufacturer’s instructions) to ensure they are in proper working order.

Spring cleaning is also a great time to check your CO alarms:

- CO alarms should be placed in a central location outside of each sleeping area and on every level of the home.
- Choose CO alarms that have been listed by a qualified testing laboratory and follow manufacturer instructions for placement and mounting height.
- CO and fire alarms should be tested monthly and replaced in accordance with manufacturer recommendations, or if they are not functioning properly.
- If the CO alarm sounds, move immediately to fresh air, and call 911.

Warning Signs

Carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning occurs when carbon monoxide builds up in the blood.

Too much CO in the air causes the body to begin replacing the oxygen in red blood cells with carbon monoxide.

This prevents oxygen from reaching tissues and organs and can lead to severe tissue damage, or even death.

Carbon monoxide poisoning can happen after prolonged exposure to small amounts of CO, or in a short period of time with exposure to higher levels.

Symptoms can include:

- Headache
- Weakness
- Dizziness
- Nausea or vomiting
- Shortness of breath
- Confusion
- Blurred vision
- Drowsiness
- Loss of muscle control
- Loss of consciousness

If you suspect carbon monoxide poisoning, move to fresh air and call 911 immediately.



Message from the Police Chief

Spring is here and summer is approaching fast. For most of us, this means looking forward to completing home projects and planning fun vacations. For many criminals, it means planning inventive new ways to commit fraud. The Winnetka Police Department would like to take this opportunity to remind residents to be cautious and avoid being victimized. Below are some of the common frauds and scams encountered by law enforcement:

<p style="text-align: center;">Home Repair Scams</p> <p>Offenders may come to a victim’s home and offer to complete unsolicited repairs. The offender may not be qualified or licensed to complete the work, or the repair may not actually be needed. This could include items such as seal coating a driveway or removing dents from a vehicle.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Ruse Burglaries</p> <p>Offenders may pretend to represent legitimate businesses such as the gas company, arriving at a residence without an appointment requesting access to a secluded location on the property such as the basement or backyard. While they have the homeowner distracted, accomplices then commit a burglary of the residence.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Law Enforcement Scams</p> <p>Offenders may contact a victim claiming to represent a law enforcement or court organization (including the Winnetka Police Department). The offender then tells the victim they are required to pay a fee to avoid legal action such as being arrested or having property seized.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">“Phishing” Business Email Scams</p> <p>Offenders may send official looking emails or text messages purporting to be from a legitimate source, such as the Illinois Tollway. The offender then may include a link or request financial information to settle an outstanding bill or charge.</p>

Below are tips to avoid being a potential victim of a scam:

- Never provide personal or financial information over the phone or via email to people, businesses, or government agencies that contact you directly. Use only official websites and the affiliated payment portals to complete business or government transactions.
- Never allow your home or property to be accessed by any business representative you did not request. Please note: no business is allowed to solicit at a residence without a valid Solicitor’s permit from the Village.
- Be aware that no government agency, including law enforcement, will ever contact residents directly to request payment to suppress or delay legal action, such as an arrest.

If you encounter any suspicious behavior, or believe you were the target of fraudulent activity, please **call 911** to report the incident to the Winnetka Police Department.

Test Backflow Assemblies Before Starting Lawn Sprinkler Systems

State statute and the Village Code require backflow prevention assemblies on all in-ground lawn sprinkler systems, and each system must be tested annually. Backflow devices protect the public water supply in the event of a reversal of the flow of water from irrigation lines. Lawn chemicals and other materials can seep into lawn sprinkler lines through sprinkler heads and other openings, potentially contaminating water in the irrigation lines. Without a properly operating backflow prevention assembly in place, the water could be siphoned into your home and the public water supply.

Since many backflow prevention assemblies are located outdoors, they are susceptible to freezing and bursting over the winter, so backflow prevention assemblies need to be tested each year when starting up a lawn irrigation system. Sprinkler Restrictions Start May 15: No Sprinkling Permitted on Consecutive Days or Between 12 PM - 6 PM

Winnetka is required to observe Illinois Department of Natural Resources' (IDNR) lawn sprinkling restrictions, which go into effect on May 15 each year. Sprinkling is prohibited between the hours of 12 PM and 6 PM, and lawn sprinkling is not allowed on consecutive days. The restricted sprinkling hours are effective until September 15.

Special approval to water lawns during prohibited hours may be requested from the Director of the Water & Electric Department for reasons such as newly seeded or sodded areas, and for the annual activation or repair of sprinkler systems. Check if Your Home Improvement Project Requires a Permit

As the weather continues to warm up, you may have some construction projects to do around your home and in your yard. Whether it is as big as building an addition onto your home or as small as expanding your patio, installing a shed or fence, or building a playhouse for your children, please remember to check the Village's website at villageofwinnetka.org/buildingpermits to determine whether your project requires a permit. Winnetka Historic Preservation Commission Preservation Awards 2025

The Village of Winnetka Historic Preservation Commission is now accepting nominations for its Preservation Awards program. The awards are an annual program that seeks to honor those exterior construction projects in the Village that have helped preserve the history and character of the community. Award categories include Restoration, Rehabilitation, and New Construction for projects that have been completed during the last five years. Single-family residential, commercial/multi-family residential, and public/institutional properties are eligible. Nomination forms are available on the Village home page or at Village Hall.

Nominations for this year's program are due by Friday, May 23, 2025. The award winners will be announced at a Village Council meeting later this year. Call JULIE Before You Dig

To avoid damaging underground utilities, residents are encouraged to call the Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators (JULIE) number prior to any digging. JULIE provides callers with a continuously-improving, one-call message handling and delivery service committed to protecting underground utilities and the safety of people working or living near them.

You may be surprised by what's buried in your yard. That's because most electric, gas, water, sewer, and telecommunications companies are delivering utility services underground. State law requires you to notify JULIE at least two business days (excludes weekends and holidays) before any digging project, regardless of the project size or depth. Even if you are digging in the same location as a previous project, notify JULIE. This is a free service.

You can prevent injury and avoid damage by following these five important steps:

- **Pre-mark or outline the proposed dig area using white paint or flags**
- **Call JULIE at 811 or 1-800-892-0123, or visit www.illinois1call.com**
- **Wait two business days**
- **Respect the marks**
- **Dig with care**

Examples of common projects requiring a call to JULIE include: planting trees, shrubs, or gardens; building decks, patios, or room additions; installing swing sets, signs, tents, fencing, or mailbox posts; or digging to place fountains or swimming pools.





Arbor Day Celebration April 25

The Village of Winnetka invites residents to participate in Arbor Day on Friday, April 25 at the Public Works Yards, 1390 Willow Road, from 7:30 AM to 4 PM. Free tree seedlings and small container plants along with seasonal tree information displays will be available. Electronics Recycling at the Public Works Yards

The Electronics Recycling Program, offered in partnership with the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC), takes place at the Winnetka Public Works Yards (1390 Willow Road) every Thursday from 1 – 3 PM, from April – November. It resumed on Thursday, April 3. The Village will continue its other recycling programs year-round, which includes recycling of items such as Styrofoam (Mondays from 1 – 3 PM, weather permitting), CFL bulbs, handheld electronics, holiday lights, and gym shoes. Coal Tar Sealant Ban Reminder

The Village bans the use of coal tar-based sealing agents on all public and private driveways, parking lots, and other roadway surfaces with Village limits. Coal tar is a waste material generated during coal processing that contains high levels of chemical compounds shown to be harmful to aquatic life and pose a potential risk to humans. This initiative was studied by the Village's Environmental and Forestry Commission as an effort to benefit water quality. As required by this ban, all contractors and multi-family property owners must obtain a Pavement Sealant Applicators License through the Public Works Department. Property owners of single-family lots applying sealant themselves do not need a Pavement Sealant Applicator's License.

As an alternative to coal tar-based sealants, the Village recommends using asphalt-based sealants (sold in most home improvement stores), replacing asphalt with concrete driveways, or leaving driveways unsealed. For more information, please call the Public Works Department at **847-716-3568**.



Spring Clean-Up Week: April 28 to May 1, 2025


Winnetka's Annual Spring Clean-Up week will be held from **April 28 to May 1**. Scheduled pickups are as follows:

- Monday, April 28: north of Tower Road
- Tuesday, April 29: Tower Road to Pine Street
- Wednesday, April 30: Pine Street to Willow Road
- Thursday, May 1: south of Willow Road

The Village's recycling contractor, Lakeshore Recycling Systems, will remove anything from the parkway that two people can reasonably lift into a truck, except electronics, yard waste, dirt, stone, logs, construction materials/debris, batteries, paint, and other liquids. To minimize litter problems, all items should be placed on residential parkways no earlier than the evening before the scheduled pickup. There will be no call-backs if the material is not on the parkway by 7 AM the day of your scheduled pick-up.

This is an excellent opportunity to clean out your attic, basement, and garage - especially of combustible materials - thereby making a significant contribution to community fire safety. Residents are encouraged to recycle items such as cardboard boxes, Styrofoam, and plastic bags before putting them out for Spring Clean-Up Week.

Historic and Architecturally Significant Maximum Building Size Bonus for Homes

In March 2021, the Village Council adopted a policy to provide a 20% maximum building size bonus for any single-family home that the Historic Preservation Commission finds to have historic or architectural significance, provided the home is not demolished or altered in a manner that compromises the home's documented significance. The bonus provides a property owner with a 20% increase in building square footage over what would be allowed by right by the Zoning Code. The goal of the bonus is to encourage property owners and developers to preserve significant homes rather than demolish them.

Since adoption of the policy, the Historic Preservation Commission has approved three property owners' applications for the building size bonus. One property owner at 595 Elm Street has taken advantage of the bonus by applying for and receiving approval of a building permit for home improvement, including an addition.
