

In May, the Council welcomed newly-elected Trustee Anne Wedner to its ranks, and Trustees Penny Lanphier and John Swierk were sworn in for their second terms. Retiring Trustee Kristin Ziv contributed generously of her time and labors, and we thank her for her service to Winnetka. The Council continues to engage with the community at its Community Conversations, held the second Saturday of each month at 10:00 AM at Peet's Coffee, on the corner of Elm and Chestnut Streets. All are welcome to stop by and say hello, ask a question or offer a comment.

The Village is making progress in negotiations with the Winnetka Park District and New Trier High School boards in the area of stormwater detention projects, in conformance with the Memorandum of Understanding signed last summer with the Forest Preserve District of Cook County. Information about upcoming Village Council meetings can be found on the Village website: VillageofWinnetka.org. Please plan to attend meetings where stormwater solutions are being discussed – the Council needs and wants community input on this important issue.

The Council's ad hoc Downtown Master Plan (DMP) Task Force is preparing to present its final Streetscape and Signage plan to the Council. This is the first implementation item of the DMP; next up will be discussions of the commercial district uses and objectives in the context of Winnetka's Retail Overlay District. The Village welcomes and needs input from the community on these important issues – please stay tuned and offer your thoughts either in person at public meetings, or by emailing ContactUs@Winnetka.org.

Phosphorus Fertilizer Prohibition



Use of phosphorus fertilizers is prohibited in Winnetka

To protect water quality by reducing phosphorus runoff, Winnetka bans the use of phosphorus-containing fertilizers. State law already prohibits the application of phosphorus-containing fertilizers by commercial enterprises. The Village's ordinance complements the state law, and allows exceptions for the Park District, and for residents when phosphorus levels don't naturally occur at high enough levels, or for newly sodded or seeded lawns.

While phosphorus is an essential nutrient for healthy plant growth, it is already present in sufficient levels in our local soils. The application of excess phosphorus degrades water quality by causing excessive growth of algae and other aquatic plants, depleting dissolved oxygen and reducing biodiversity.

Phosphorus-free and organic fertilizers are an effective alternative that can be found at most hardware stores. If you have any questions, please contact the Public Works Department at 847-716-3568.

Council Action Summary

2017/18 Winnetka Village Council

April 3, 2018: The Village's Liquor Code was amended to provide a license classification for certain qualifying pharmacies in order to allow Walgreens, opening soon in Hubbard Woods, to sell alcoholic beverages. A Special Use Permit was approved to allow the expansion and rehabilitation of a Community House parking lot along Lincoln Avenue. The Council discussed a Streetscape and Signage update from the Downtown Master Plan (DMP) Task Force, which has been formulating an improvement plan, as recommended by the DMP. After hearing the Task Force's preliminary recommendations, the Council asked for more information on the issues of on-street parking and sequencing of infrastructure improvements.

April 10, 2018: The Council discussed its options for pursuing a Jurisdictional Transfer of Green Bay Road from the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT). It was learned that reaching consensus with IDOT on a transfer can take anywhere from three to 24 months, depending on the level of control the Village desires. Control over Green Bay Road could ultimately be an important component of the overall Streetscape and Signage planning; however, no immediate action was taken.

April 17, 2018: A Village Code amendment was approved to streamline the Purchasing Code for routine change orders and Village purchases, while preserving the Council's authority to approve purchases in large amounts. A Special Use Permit was granted to allow the opening of Mathnasium in Hubbard Woods on Gage Street; a provision of the approval was that all employees will park on the upper deck of the Hubbard Woods parking structure. The 2018 Environmental & Forestry Commission Green Award honorees were presented with their awards: the Community House in the Energy category for its replacement of over 2,500 incandescent light bulbs with LED bulbs; and Jan and David Bawden in the

Green Awards Recipients



At the April 17 Village Council meeting, recipients of the Environmental & Forestry Commission's second annual Green Awards were recognized for their exceptional commitment to environmental best practices. Award categories included Green Buildings; Recycling/Waste Reduction; Land; Air; Water/Stormwater; Energy; and Innovation/Other.

The Winnetka Community House won an award in the Energy category for their replacement of over incandescent light bulbs with LED bulbs in replacement of incandescent light bulbs, resulting in cost savings of approximately \$37,000 annually, and energy savings of 313,948 kWh per year.

Jan and David Bawden of 129 DeWindt Road, won an award in the of Water/Stormwater category for their construction of a large-scale rain garden to effectively store and clean groundwater runoff and subsequently reduce flooding on their property. The Bawdens also installed French drains to collect and release additional stormwater.

Grill Safety – Cooking Outdoors in a Safe Manner

The Winnetka Fire Department encourages residents to practice safe habits while enjoying outdoor cooking. The National Fire Protection Agency notes that in 2014, over 16,000 people went to the hospital for injuries involving barbeque grills; roughly half the injuries were burns. Factors that contribute to most grill fires include:

- Failure to clean the grill
- Combustibles too close to the grill catch on fire
- Leaks or breaks in one of the gas lines/maintenance issues



Be sure to let coals extinguish completely after cooking

Whether you are using a gas or charcoal grill, please keep these safety factors in mind:

- Charcoal or propane grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be kept away from structures, overhangs and other items that are combustible.
- Keep children and pets at least 3 feet from the grill.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat build-up on the burners and in the trays below.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Make sure your grill is on solid ground so it does not tip over.
- Never leave items hanging over the side of the grill that may be pulled down by a child.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

After using a charcoal grill or fireplace, completely extinguish the coals or logs, and then place them into a metal container out of doors and away from any structure. The Winnetka Fire Department has responded to several fires due to coals or logs that were thought to be extinguished placed into garbage receptacles – resulting in a fire next to the home. Typically, these fires smolder until night-time, when the family is sleeping.

The Fire Department wants residents to enjoy the season for outdoor cooking, while always keeping safety in mind. Bon appetit!

Summer Hydrant Flushing

Over the summer months, the Fire Department will flow-test hydrants in Winnetka. Signs will be placed in the areas to be tested; to see a map of the testing areas for the next few weeks, visit the News section on home page of the Village's website, VillageofWinnetka.org.

During flow testing, sediment accumulations are removed from the water system. You may notice water discoloration for a brief period after the flow test in your area. While the water is safe to drink, it can discolor laundry; run the faucet for several minutes or until the discoloration subsides. If the water does not become clear after this procedure, please contact the Water Department at 847-716-3558.

Stormwater category for a drainage and water retention project at their home on DeWindt Road. The Green Awards honor those community members who demonstrate an exceptional commitment to environmental best practices; applications are being accepted for the 2019 Green Awards. May 1, 2018: The Council bid farewell to retiring Trustee Kristin Ziv, welcomed new Trustee Anne Wedner, and congratulated Trustees Penny Lanphier and John Swierk on their election to a second term.

May 8, 2018: The Council discussed the results of the Village's Refuse Survey, with an eye towards a more equitable funding mechanism and other service enhancements. In light of new tax regulations that limit deductions for property taxes, staff was directed to develop a refuse collection schedule funded through service fees, for discussion during the 2019 Budget sessions. It was agreed that a fee-for-service model gives residents more control over their refuse collection expenses, and provides for more equitable funding. The community will be kept apprised of where the tax savings from the implementation of such a measure would go.

May 15, 2018: The Council approved a contract to renovate the Fire Department's obsolete HVAC system, which is currently run on a DOS-based software. A user agreement for new communications equipment for the Police Department was also approved, in the final phase of the transition to a combined dispatch system.

Shoppers will be welcomed by many produce and food-related vendors, as well as other retailers and local Chamber members. The market will be open rain or shine!



Summer Safety Messages



As summer is fast approaching, the Winnetka Police Department would like to share a few tips to help promote the safety of our community.

Traffic safety is always a priority, particularly when the weather is warm and bicyclists use the roads. We ask that motorists and bicyclists respect each other and share the road, and bear in mind that traffic laws apply to bicyclists and vehicles alike. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, bicyclists accounted for 2.2 percent of all traffic deaths in 2016. Motorists should allow for enough space when approaching or overtaking a bicyclist, and only pass when it is safe to do so. The Police Department ask that everyone do their part in exercising due care when vehicles and bicycles share the road.

Residents can go a long way in helping deter auto related crimes. Last summer, many vehicles were left unlocked with valuables and key/fob left inside. This resulted in stolen property, stolen vehicles, and the inconvenience of owners having to cancel credit cards, notify insurance companies, and dispute tolls.

Of greater concern is that individuals committing these crimes have been known to carry weapons. The convenience of leaving valuables and key/fob is not worth the associated risk. Please remove your valuables and lock your vehicle. If your vehicle is parked in the driveway, illuminate the outside of your home. Do not hesitate to call 911 if you see or hear something suspicious. Let the Police Department help you protect your property.

It is not uncommon for us to receive complaints of pets left in parked vehicles. On an 80 degree day, the temperature inside a vehicle will reach almost 100 degrees in just ten minutes. Consider alternatives to leaving your pet inside the vehicle, such as using drive-thru windows when available; or frequenting businesses which allow pets inside; or running errands with a friend who can stay outside with your pet.

Rehabilitation generally consists of milling the existing surface, repairing and/or replacing curbs where needed, and resurfacing. Minor storm and sanitary sewer structure repair will be performed as necessary.

Reconstruction means the complete removal and replacement of the existing pavement, curb/gutter, and base course; along with necessary repair/replacement of underground utilities. As this work requires much cooperation with affected residents, the Village will supply a detailed schedule of construction events and instructions to area residents.

Pavement Patching: This minor work will be performed throughout the Village to address winter weather destruction and damages caused by water main breaks. Advance notice will be provided to affected residents.

Pavement Striping: Placement of thermoplastic pavement markings at various locations.

Electric Safety – Power Lines



Call the Electric Department if you see a downed line

During storms, high winds, and other emergencies, power lines may come down onto the ground. It is best to assume that all lines are live. Always maintain a safe distance (10ft. or greater) from power lines. Many of these lines are not insulated, and any contact with them, direct or indirect, can cause harm. Keep yourself and others away from any fallen lines. Wires touching the ground may still be energized.

Never let children climb trees near power lines. Hire a qualified contractor to perform any tree trimming near power lines. If you have questions about removing limbs near power lines, call the Water & Electric Department at 847-716-3558.
